Josh Breese brought in pictures of Morris chairs he built from New Yankee Workshop plans and a Limber table from Fine Woodworking. Josh's wife learned upholstery to make the cushions. The evening was turned over to a feature speaker, George Armstrong, for a discussion on segmented bowl turning. George began discussing how he glues each individual segment together using a "rub joint" technique until a half circle is achieved. Starting with two half circles will allow one to see and adjust variations in the completed ring. Light sanding is employed to counter the variation. Old laminate sink counters make a good surface for glue ups as the glue does not stick to the laminate surface. A math based approach is used to determine the proper angle for cutting segments. Expect to spend the bulk of one's time at the table saw and sander, minimal time spent doing the actual turning. It is good practice to first cut test pieces from MDF scrap.



George recommended turning resources from Malcolm Tibbits at <u>http://www.tahoeturner.com</u> and a book by Ron Hampton – Segmented Turning - A Complete Guide as starting points. Geometry and Trigonometry are used to define the segment dimensions. There is a misconception that segmented turning saves wood due to lack of hollowing. Reality is that segmented turning does not save wood. And since dry wood is used, it is dusty and hard on tools. A Wixie angle gage is used to set saw blade angles and 0.003" feeler gage for setup. If the turning has voids, one will want to turn as fast as possible to allow the cutting tool to float over the voids rather than dropping in to the void. Always wear a good impact face shield.



Tips for table saw setup: The table saw arbor should be solid and not made from stamped washers. Don't use a blade stabilizer; the cup of the stabilizer will create a pressure miss match on the blade. Freud makes a glue line rip blade with ~ 40 teeth. Smaller diameter blades cut better due to less blade flutter. Miter saws are acceptable, but not as stable as a table saw. Use zero clearance fence or blade inserts. Blade hook angle needs to be 0 to  $-5^{\circ}$  rake. A positive angle will throw pieces.

George had a most incredible bowl made of Purple Heart, Maple and Ebony. It was not yet finished but looked amazing as is. He is working out the proper sanding technique to prevent bleeding of colors via sanding dust. He is planning on a coat of sanding sealer to prevent cross color dust contamination.



George gave us a wonderful presentation packed full of information. The pictures don't do justice to his work. The colors, the feel, and intricate details are incredible to behold. Thanks George for a great evening.
